## PRICES RECEIVED INDEX UP 9 POINTS PRICES PAID INDEX UP 3 POINTS

The Index of Prices Received by Farmers increased 9 points (6 percent) to 172 percent of the January-December 1967 average during the month ended June 15, 1973, according to the Crop Reporting Board. Contributing most to the increase since mid-May were higher prices for soybeans, corn, hogs, potatoes, wheat, and eggs. The index was 38 percent above a year earlier.

The Index of Prices Paid by Farmers for Commodities and Services, Interest, Taxes, and Farm Wage Rates for June 15 was 146, up 3 points (2 percent) from mid-May. Higher prices for livestock feed, motor fuels, and food, were major contributors to the increase. The index was 16 percent above a year earlier.

## PRICES RECEIVED BY FARMERS

The Index of Prices Received by Farmers increased 9 points (6 percent) during the month ended June 15 to 172 percent of its 1967 average. Of the subgroups shown on page 7, the following contributed most to the net change.

OIL-BEARING CROPS: Continued sharply higher prices for soybean and flaxseed increased the index for oil-bearing crops 44 points (18 percent) during the month ended June 15. At 286 percent, (1967=100), the index set a record high for the fifth month in a row. Soybeans average \$10.00 per bushel, up \$1.73 from mid-May and more than triple the June 1972 price of \$3.32 per bushel. Flaxseed at \$5.48 per bushel was up over a dollar from a month earlier and more than double that of a year earlier. The record high price for flaxseed is \$8.16 per bushel in March 1947.

FEED GRAINS AND HAY: The feed grain and hay index increased 21 points (15 percent) during the month ended June 15 to 161 percent. Price increases of 12 to 24 percent for the four feed grains were only slightly offset by lower hay prices. Corn at \$1.99 per bushel was up 38 cents from a month earlier and 57 cents from mid-April. Hay at \$35.20 per ton was down \$2.30 from mid-May's record of \$37.50. Compared with June 1972 index was up 58 points (56 percent). Price increases from a year earlier for the feed grains ranged from 36 percent for oats to 76 percent for corn. Hay prices were 14 percent higher.

FOOD GRAINS: The index of prices received by farmers for food grains increased 16 points (11 percent) during the month ended June 15. At 164 the index was 70 points above a year earlier but 18 points below the record of 182 for January 1948. Wheat at \$2.43 per bushel compares with \$1.33 a year earlier and was at the highest level in over 25 years.

POTATOES, SWEETPOTATOES, AND DRY BEANS: The index of prices received by farmers for potatoes, sweetpotatoes and dry beans increased 64 points (30 percent) during the month ended June 15, due primarily to higher potato prices. Farmers received an average of \$6.18 per cwt., for potatoes, the highest price in over 50 years and 33 percent more than a month earlier. Record high prices received for sweetpotatoes and dry beans also contributed to the index rise. Farmers averaged \$14.00 per cwt., for seasonally light supplies of sweetpotatoes, 39 percent higher than in May and \$15.10 per cwt., for dry beans, and 18 percent increase. Compared with a year earlier the index was up 142 points (108 percent).

POULTRY AND EGGS: Increased prices for most poultry items raised the poultry and egg index to 167 during the month ended June 15, an increase of 8 percent. Broiler prices were up 0.7 cent, averaging 24.5 cents per pound, while chickens other than broilers brought 15.1 cents per pound, down 0.3 cent. Egg prices increased 5.6 cents since mid-May to average 50.6 cents per dozen, a record high for the month. Turkeys brought 33.1 cent per pound, up 2.0 cents from a month earlier. The index was 76 percent above June 1972.

MEAT ANIMALS: The index of prices received for meat animals increased 5 points (3 percent) to 198 during the month ended June 15, 1973. Prices for most meat animals were above a month earlier. Beef prices averaged a record \$43.80 per cwt., 30 cents more than in May and 20 cents above the previous high of March 1973. Hog prices at \$37.20 per cwt., were \$2.00 above the previous month, but \$1.10 below the March 1973 record. Calves averaged \$58.70 per cwt., no change from the record price of May 1973. Lamb prices averaged \$36.20 per cwt., \$2.40 above the previous month, but \$3.30 below the record set in March 1973. The meat animal index was up 49 points (33 percent) from a year earlier.

Receipts of hogs at reporting yards during the 4 weeks ended June 16 were down 12 percent, cattle and calves combined were up 1 percent, while sheep and lambs increased 35 percent over the previous 4-week reporting period.

## PRICES PAID BY FARMERS

The index of prices paid by farmers for commodities and services for June 15, at 143 percent of its 1967 average, was 4 points (3 percent) above a month earlier and 20 points (16 percent) above June 1972.

### PRODUCTION INDEX UP SHARPLY

The index of prices paid by farmers for production goods for mid-June climbed to a record 149, up 6 points (4 percent) from a month earlier. Feed, farm machinery, and motor supply prices were the major contributors to the index rise. The index was 28 points (23 percent) above a year earlier.

FEED: The index of prices paid by farmers for feed, at a record 177, advanced 22 points (14 percent) from last month. Prices averaged higher for feed ingredients and mixed feeds. Hay prices showed a small decline. The index was 69 percent above June 1972. Poultry and milk feed ratios (pounds of feed equal in value to one dozen eggs or one pound of poultry or milk) all declined sharply from a month earlier and are at or near record lows.

FARM MACHINERY: The mid-June index of prices paid for farm machinery advanced 4 percent from last March when last surveyed. Combines and pick-up balers, which had not been priced since last September, contributed most to the increase. Compared with mid-June last year, the farm machinery index was up 8 percent.

MOTOR SUPPLIES: Prices paid by farmers for motor supplies at mid-June averaged 3 percent above mid-May. Higher gasoline prices accounted for most of the increase. Motor supply prices averaged 6 percent more than a year earlier.

### FAMILY LIVING INDEX UP

At 137, the mid-June index of prices paid by farmers for family living items was up 1 point (3/4 percent) from mid-May. Food and tobacco, and autos and auto supplies accounted for most of the increase. Compared with mid-June 1972 the index was up 10 percent.

FOOD AND TOBACCO: Prices paid by farmers for food and tobacco in mid-June averaged 1 1/2 percent above the previous month. Higher prices were reported for most of the items surveyed. Prices averaged 14 percent above June 1972.

CLOTHING AND TEXTILES: Mid-June prices paid for clothing and textiles averaged slightly less than a month earlier. Price changes were mixed, with decreases more than offsetting the increases. Compared with a year ago, clothing and textile prices were up 8 percent.

BUILDING MATERIALS, HOUSE: Average prices for building materials were unchanged from a month earlier, but were 17 percent above June 1972.

UNITED STATES PRICE

The season average price for the United States is computed by weighting State season average prices by quantities sold.

DEFINITION OF TERMS

In the following tables price data, unless otherwise noted, are the average prices farmers receive for their products on a local market basis at the point of first sale, commonly referred to as the average price as sold. For example, if in a given State, half of the fruit is sold f.o.b. packed by growers, one-fourth sold as bulk fruit at the packinghouse door, and one-fourth sold retail or at roadside stands, then the "average price as sold" is a weighted average of the prices applicable to the three positions.

For most fruits in the Pacific Coast States, prices are expressed as packinghouse-door returns which is the common basis upon which settlement is made with the grower in the area. The equivalent packinghouse-door returns represent actual prices adjusted to apply to returns at the packinghouse door. That is, the f.o.b. packed price is adjusted to the incoming packinghouse door by subtracting all costs that accumulate between the incoming packinghouse door and the f.o.b. local shipping point, such as grading, packing, packing material, inspection fees, selling and other costs. Equivalent on-tree returns are derived by subtracting costs of picking and hauling fruit to the packinghouse from the equivalent packinghouse-door returns. This estimate is made by the Crop Reporting Board for certain fruits in certain areas primarily to meet the needs of the Department in administering marketing agreements under the Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act of 1937 as amended.

PROCESSING PRICES

Processing prices for non-citrus fruit crops are published in the supplement on the basis of equivalent returns for fruit delivered to the processing plant door.

\*PART I containing price statistics for apricots, berries, cherries, figs, grapes, nectarines, peaches, pears, persimmons, plums, pomegranates, and prunes was published April 30, 1973 as a supplement to AGRICULTURAL PRICES. A similar report will be issued for tree nuts on July 30, 1973 and for citrus fruits on September 28, 1973.
