

# AGRICULTURAL PRICES



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PRICES RECEIVED INDEX UP 9 POINTS  
PRICES PAID INDEX UP 4 POINTS

The August Index of Prices Received by Farmers increased 9 points (3.6 percent) to 256 percent of its January-December 1967 average, according to the Crop Reporting Board. Contributing most to the increase since July were higher prices for hogs, cattle, corn, eggs, potatoes, and soybeans. The index was 18 points (7.6 percent) above a year ago.

The Index of Prices Paid by Farmers for Commodities and Services, Interest, Taxes and Farm Wage Rates for August 15 was 284, up 4 points (1.4 percent) from mid-July. Higher prices for feed and feeder livestock were the major contributors to the increase. The index for August 1980 was 33 points (13 percent) higher than a year earlier.

## PRICES RECEIVED BY FARMERS

The August Index of Prices Received by Farmers increased 9 points (3.6 percent) from the previous month to 256 percent of its 1967 average. Compared to a year earlier, the index was up 18 points (7.6 percent). Of the subgroups shown on page 6, the following contributed most to the net increase from July.

MEAT ANIMALS: At 281, the mid-August index of prices received for meat animals was up 14 points (5.2 percent) from a month ago. Mid-August hog prices averaged \$46.80 per cwt, an increase of \$5.60 from the July average. Calf prices were \$2.40 above July, at \$77.40 per cwt. Beef cattle prices, at \$65.10 per cwt, were \$1.90 above a month earlier. The meat animal index was 21 points (8.1 percent) above August 1979.

FEED GRAINS AND HAY: The mid-August index of prices received by farmers for feed grains and hay was 258, an increase of 15 points (6.2 percent) from July. All commodities showed price increases. Corn at \$2.93 per bushel was up 20 cents and sorghum grain increased 31 cents to \$5.33 per cwt. Oats brought \$1.55 per bushel, up 5 cents and barley averaged 4 cents higher at \$2.56 per bushel. Hay at \$68.20 per ton was up \$1.70. The index was 38 points (17 percent) above August 1979.

POULTRY AND EGGS: At 207, the index for poultry and eggs increased 12 points (6.2 percent) from July. Eggs, at 58.0 cents per dozen, were up 7.3 cents. Turkey prices averaged 39.7 cents per pound, up 2.9 cents from last month. Broilers were off .2 cent at 31.5 cents per pound. Compared to a year ago, the index was up 34 points (20 percent).

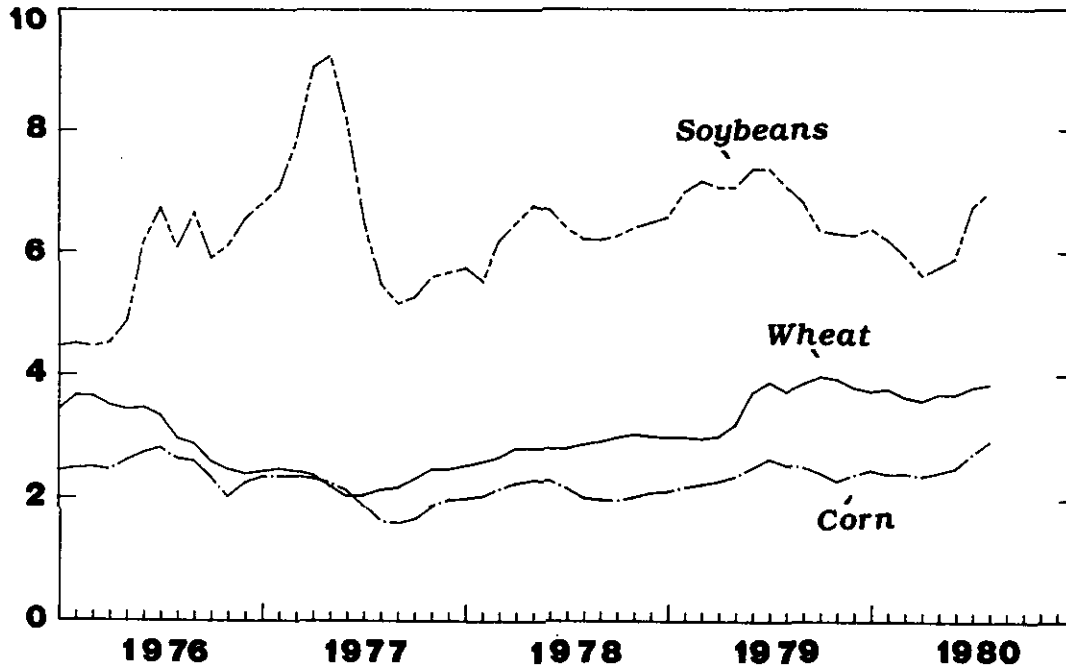
POTATOES, SWEETPOTATOES, AND DRY BEANS: The August index of prices received for potatoes, sweetpotatoes, and dry beans at 352 was up 38 points (12 percent) from last month. Potato prices averaged \$7.55 per cwt, up \$1.06 from July. Sweetpotato prices were down \$2.80 to \$10.30 per cwt, but dry beans increased \$1.00 to \$26.60. The index was 151 points (75 percent) above a year ago.

OIL-BEARING CROPS: The index of prices received by farmers for oil-bearing crops at 252 increased 7 points (2.9 percent) from the previous month. Soybeans at \$6.99 per bushel were up 24 cents and flaxseed at \$7.03 per bushel increased 48 cents. The index was 5 points (1.9 percent) below a year earlier.

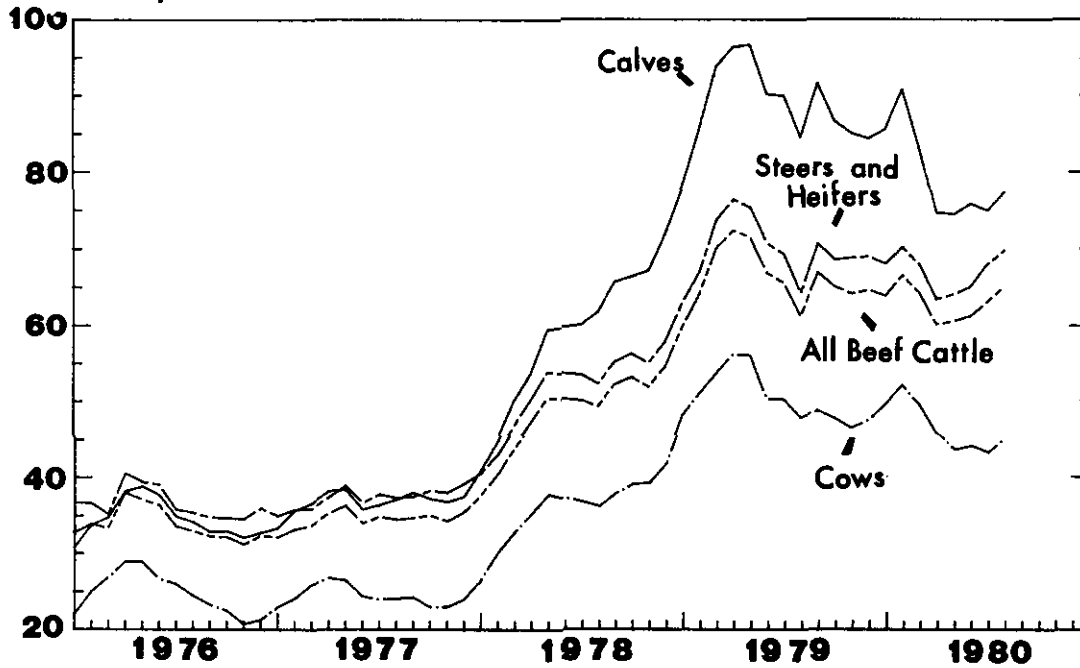
DAIRY PRODUCTS: At 254, the August index of prices received by farmers for dairy products increased 4 points (1.6 percent) from July. The average price of all milk sold to plants and dealers at \$12.80 per cwt was up 20 cents from a month earlier. Compared to a year ago, the index was up 16 points (6.7 percent).

### PRICES PAID INCLUDING INTEREST, TAXES AND WAGE RATES (PPITW)

The mid-August Index of Prices Paid for Commodities and Services, Interest, Taxes and Farm Wage Rates was 284, up 4 points (1.4 percent) from July. The index was 33 points (13 percent) above a year earlier.

### PRODUCTION INDEX UP

The index of prices paid for farm production goods and services for August was 278, up 5 points (1.8 percent) from a month earlier. Higher prices for feed, feeder livestock and building materials were the major contributors to the index rise. Slightly lower prices for gasoline and diesel fuel partially offset the increases shown by most other production input items. Compared to August 1979, the index was up 29 points (12 percent).

FEED: The mid-August index of prices paid for feed at 238 was up 15 points (6.7 percent) from the previous month. Prices for most feed items were 2 to 10 percent higher this month with mixed poultry feeds and feed grains contributing most to the increase. Compared to a year ago, the index was up 13 percent.

FEEDER LIVESTOCK: The index of prices paid for feeder livestock at 280 was up 10 points (3.7 percent) from a month ago. The prices for replacement livestock and poultry were higher in mid-August as feeder pigs prices increased \$17.50 per cwt and feeder cattle and calves advanced \$2.00 per cwt. The index was 1.4 percent above August 1979.

BUILDING AND FENCING MATERIALS: The August 15 index of prices paid for building and fencing materials at 299 was 8 points (2.7 percent) above mid-June. Higher prices for galvanized steel roofing and plywood contributed most to the increase. The index was 7.9 percent above August a year ago.

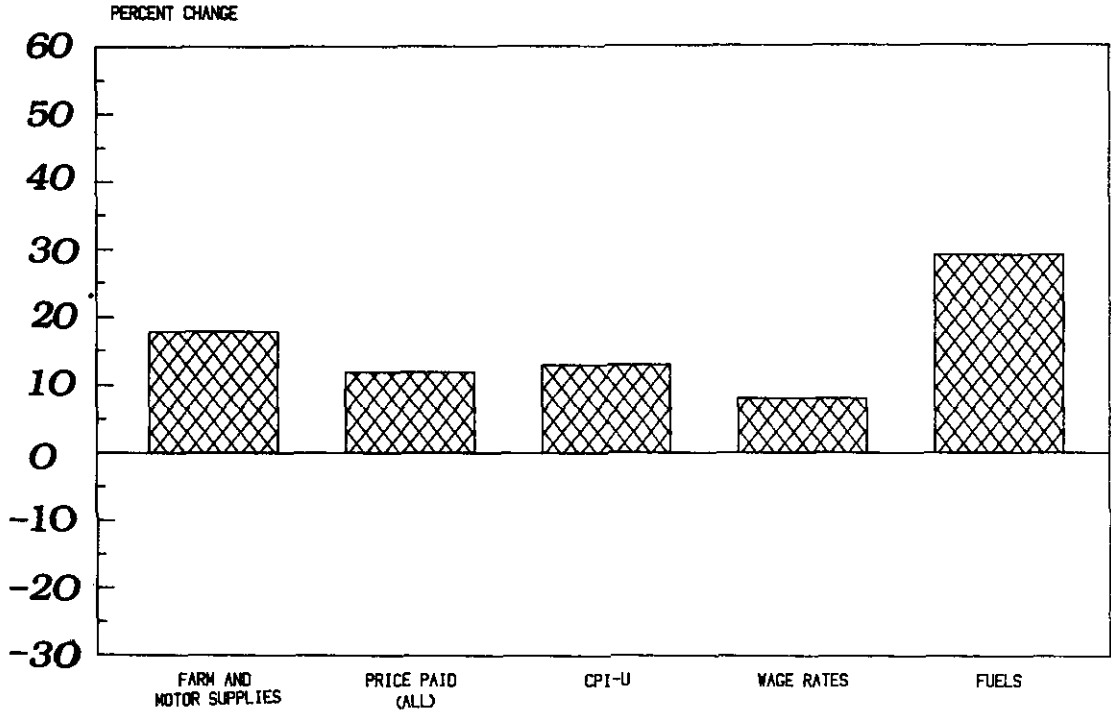
FARM AND MOTOR SUPPLIES: At 227, the August 15 index of prices paid for farm and motor supplies was 1.3 percent above mid-July. Prices were higher for nearly all farm supply items surveyed. The index was 18 percent above a year earlier.

FUELS AND ENERGY: The mid-August index of prices paid by farmers for fuels and energy was 385, down .8 percent from a month earlier. This was the first monthly decline since December 1977. The price decline of one cent per gallon for gasoline and two cents per gallon for diesel fuel more than offset the increase for L.P. gas. Compared to August 1979, the index was up 29 percent.

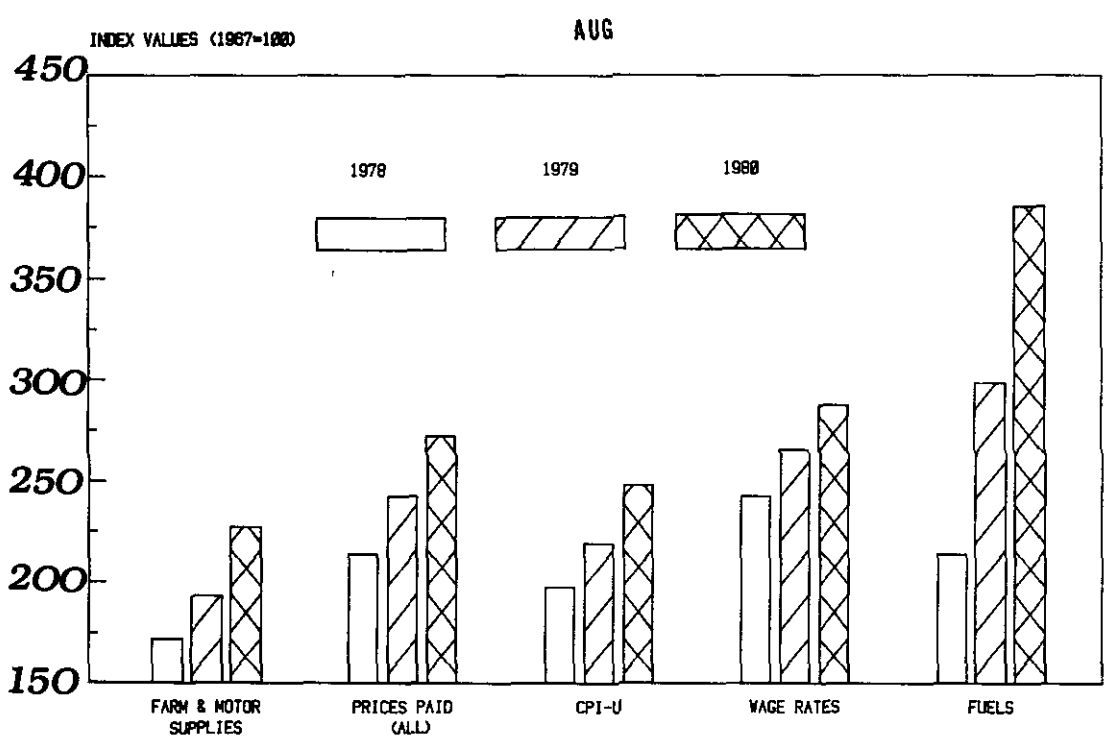
### CONSUMER PRICE INDEX (CPI-U)

At 247.8, the unadjusted July 1980 Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers was up .1 percent from a month earlier and 13 percent higher than in July 1979. On a seasonally adjusted basis, the CPI-U was unchanged from June to July. This was the first time since March 1967 that the CPI-U has not registered a month to month increase. The major contributor to the leveling off was the index for housing which declined .7 percent, as mortgage interest rates declined. Offsetting the decline in housing costs were higher prices for nearly all other major categories of consumer spending. The food and beverage index led the way as it rose .9 percent. Entertainment was up .8 percent while medical care increased .7 percent and other goods and services advanced .5 percent. Transportation and apparel and upkeep were each up .4 percent.

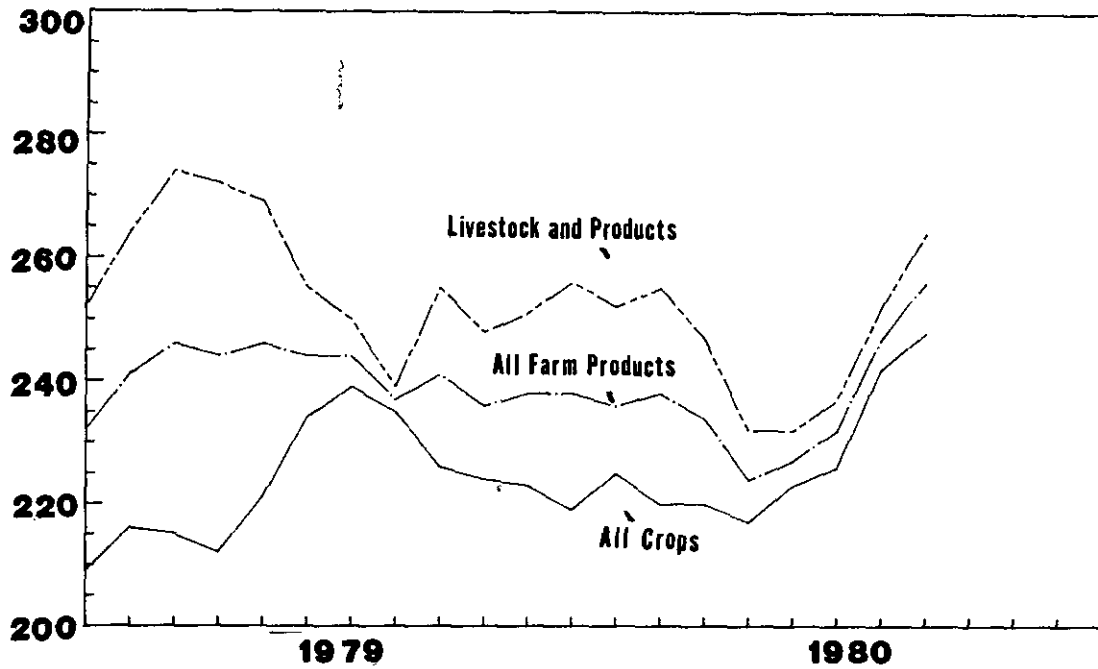

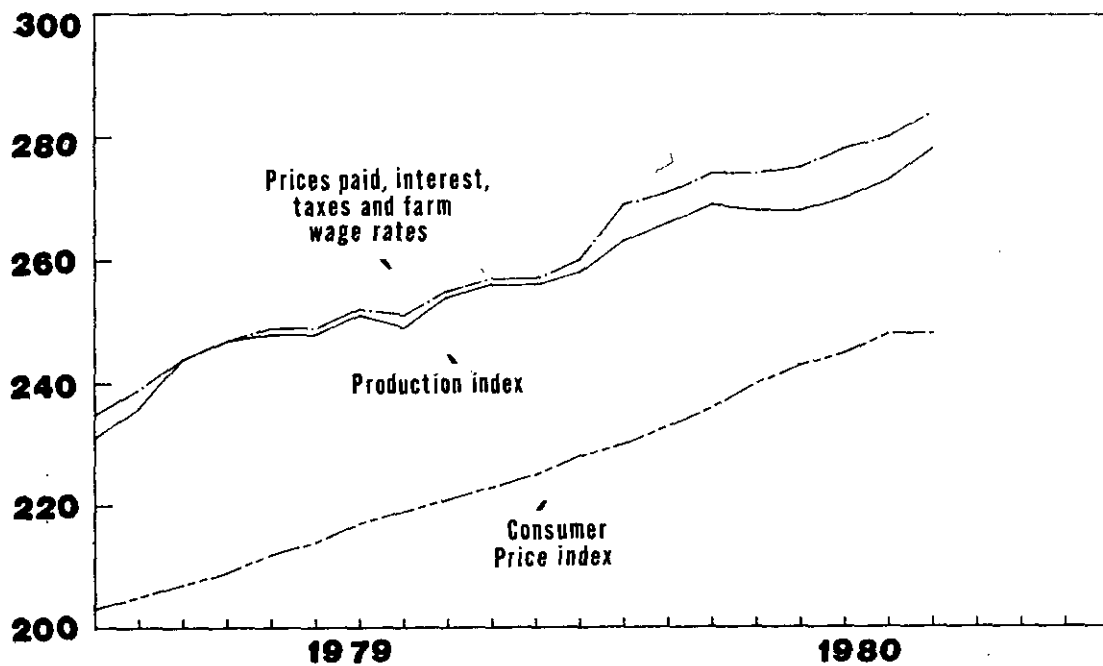
## Index of Prices Received by Farmers

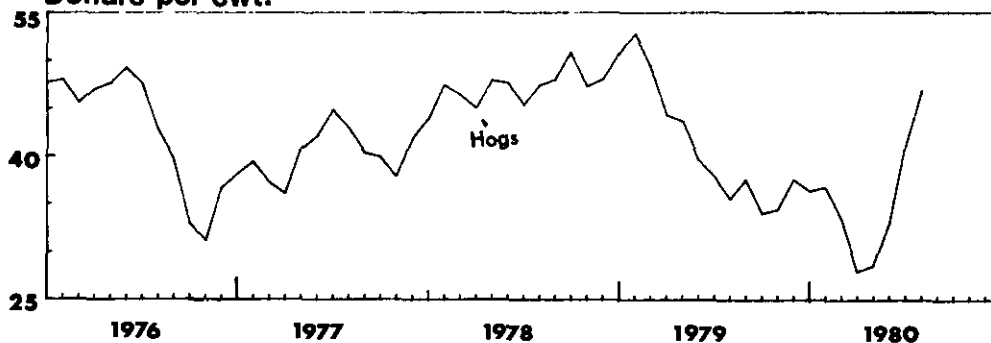

THE INDEX OF PRICES PAID BY FARMERS, INCLUDING  
INTEREST, TAXES, AND FARM WAGE RATES

One of the important indicators of changing economic conditions affecting American agriculture is the Index of Prices Paid by Farmers, including Interest, Taxes, and Farm Wage Rates--commonly known as the Parity Index. This index measures the average change in prices paid for commodities and services commonly bought by farmers and ranchers.

The Parity Index is made up of 5 major components. In terms of farm expenditures, the two most important components are the index of prices paid for commodities used in farm production and the commodities used in family living represented by the Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index (CPI-U). These two indexes comprise the Index of Prices Paid by farmers for Goods and Services. The remaining three components of the Parity Index are: (1) Interest charges per acre on mortgage indebtedness secured by farm real estate; (2) Taxes payable per acre on farm real estate; and (3) Wage rates paid to hired farm labor.

The Farm Production Index is divided into 12 group indexes--feed, feeder livestock, seed, fertilizer, agricultural chemicals fuels and energy, farm and motor supplies, autos and trucks, tractor and self-propelled machinery, other machinery, building and fencing materials, and farm services and cash rent. Each group represents an important class of farm expenditure and provides the basis for comparing price changes for the various groups of commodities and services that farmers buy. As of June 15, 1980, the farm production component of the Parity Index included 180 different commodity price series.

Source of Data and Method of Computation

Price data used in the computation of the various indexes are collected from stores serving rural areas. The U.S. commodity prices are computed by weighting State or region estimates of average prices by the estimated quantities of products purchased by farmers in each State or region. U.S. average prices are then combined into the group indexes, using as weights the estimated quantities of commodities purchased by farmers during 1971-73 based on sample surveys of farmers' expenditures. Agricultural Research Service and Agricultural Marketing Service data supplemented the survey indications.

Production sub-group indexes are combined into the production index, using percentage weights representing the estimated proportion of expenditures for each commodity group. These were derived primarily from the 1971-73 Expenditure Surveys. The production index and the CPI are in turn combined into the all-commodity index of prices paid, using weights representing the proportionate expenditures for these two components. In like manner, all commodities, interest, tax, and wage rate components are weighted, on the basis of relative expenditures, to obtain the Parity Index.

Over the years, there have been substantial changes in the commodity consists of goods and services purchased by farmers which necessitated both periodic revision in the weighting pattern and shifts in commodity coverage. From 1910 to March 1935 estimated purchases by farmers during 1924-29 were the basis for weights. For the period March 1935 to September 1952 the basis for weights was estimated purchases by farmers during 1937-41. For the period September 1952 - January 1965 the basis for weights was the 1955 Farm Production Expenditure Surveys. For the period starting in January of 1965, weights are based on the 1971-73 Expenditure Surveys.

The indexes are first computed on a 1971-73 base and then converted to the 1910-14 base by linking to the 1910-14 index as of January 1965. The 1910-14 indexes are converted to a 1967=100 base to facilitate comparisons with other major indexes.

### Use of the Indexes

The Prices Paid Indexes are widely used as measures of change for prices of commodities and services bought by farmers. The CPI component measures the average change in prices paid for consumer goods on a nationwide basis. Similarly, the production component measures the average change in prices paid by farmers for goods and services used in farm production. The interest, tax, and wage rate components are a measure of average change in amount paid by farmers. The Parity Index--Index of Prices Paid by Farmers, including Interest, Taxes, and Farm Wage Rates--provides a comprehensive measure of changes in prices and costs in the farm sector. It is used in computing Parity prices for agricultural products. The legal basis and methods used in computing Parity prices are described in the July 1975 issue of AGRICULTURAL PRICES, Supplement No. 6, Pages 3-9. The Parity Index is defined in Title III, Subtitle A, Section 301 (a) of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938 as amended by the Agricultural Acts of 1948, 1949, 1954, and 1956, as follows: "The 'parity index' as of any date, shall be the ratio of (i) the general level of prices for articles and services that farmers buy, wages paid hired farm labor, interest on farm indebtedness secured by farm real estate, and taxes on farm real estate, for the calendar month ending last before such date to (ii) the general level of such prices, wages, rates, and taxes during the period January 1910 to December 1914, inclusive."

### THE PARITY RATIO

The parity Ratio--the Index of Prices Received by Farmers for All Commodities divided by the Parity Index (1910-14=100) provides an indication of the per unit purchasing power of farm commodities in terms of the goods and services currently bought by farmers, in relation to purchasing power of farm products in the 1910-14 base period. Thus, a Parity Ratio greater than 100 indicates that the average per unit purchasing power of all farm products is higher than in 1910-14.

The Parity Ratio is a measure of price relationship; not a measure of farm income, of farmers' total purchasing power, or of farmers' welfare. The latter depends upon a number of factors other than price relationships, such as changes in production efficiency and technology, quantities of farm products sold, and supplementary income, including that from off-farm jobs and federal farm programs.

An adjusted parity ratio is computed and published which incorporates and reflects supplementary income from federal farm programs. A "Preliminary Adjusted Parity Ratio reflecting Government payments" based on the forecast of direct Government payments for the year is published each month in AGRICULTURAL PRICES.

RELATIVE IMPORTANCE

The relative importance of the component indexes that make up the Index of Prices Paid by Farmers, including Interest, Taxes and Farm Wage Rates are calculated as of June 15 each year. Relative importance is the percent of total contribution that an item or subgroup index contributes to the overall Prices Paid Index at a given point in time. The change in relative importance from year to year is determined by the rates of price change for various items in relation to each other. It reflects the impact of the index items at current price levels on the overall index. This may be more or less than the previous year or base weight period as a result of larger or smaller price changes for an item or index compared with other items or indexes.

Quantity weights used for index computation are based on the 1971-73 period. Relative importance in the 1971-73 base period for individual commodities was published in INDEX NUMBERS OF PRICES RECEIVED AND PRICES PAID BY FARMERS, Pr. 1-5 (76), May 1976, pages 47-51.
