CATTLE: CONTINUED CURTAILMENT OF RECEIPTS ALONG WITH MORE DEPENDABLE AND BROADER OUTLET GAVE ANOTHER BOOST TO PRACTICALLY ALL CLASSES OF CATTLE; COMPARED WEEK AGO, FED STEERS AND YEARLINGS MOSTLY 25-50¢ HIGHER, LIGHT WEIGHTS UP MOST, YEARLING HEIFERS 25-50¢ UP, MOST BUTCHER COWS AND HEIFERS AROUND 25¢ HIGHER, KINDS SHOWING GRASS; FAILING TO STRENGTHEN. LOW CUTTERS AND CUTTERS STEADY, BULLS 25-40¢ HIGHER, DESIRABLE LIGHT WEIGHT VEALERS STRONG TO 50¢ HIGHER, WEIGHTY KINDS UNEVENLY LOWER, LONG YEARLING STEERS TOPPED AT \$8.90, MIXED YEARLINGS \$8.75, MEDIUM WEIGHT BEEVES \$8.65 AND BIG WEIGHTS \$8.25, BULK FED STEERS AND YEARLINGS \$7.25-8.25; YEARLING HEIFERS TOPPED AT \$8.60, WITH BULK \$7.50-8.25. MOST FAT COWS \$4.75-5.75, FEW CHOICE TO \$6.25. LOW CUTTERS MOSTLY \$2.75-3.00 AND STRONG WEIGHTS TO \$3.75 AND BETTER; WEIGHTY SAUSAGE BULLS MAINLY \$4.15-4.35, BETTER GRADE VEALERS SCALING UNDER 140# \$9.00-9.50.

HOGS: ACTIVITY FEATURED TRADE ON WEEK'S LIMITED SUPPLY, SHIPPERS BOUGHT MORE FREELY AND SMALL LOCAL HOUSES WERE AGGRESSIVE BUYERS. COMPARED ONE WEEK AGO, MARKET MOSTLY 35-50¢ HIGHER, PACKING SOWS AND HEAVY BUTCHERS 25-40¢ UP; WEEK'S EXTREME TOP \$6.85 PAID TODAY. LATE BULK 180-250# \$6.65-6.80, 260-320# \$6.40-6.65, 320-370# \$6.00-6.40. GOOD TO CHOICE 140-170# \$6.40-6.65, PIGS \$6.15-6.50. PACKING SOWS \$5.15-5.50, SMOOTH LIGHT WEIGHTS TO \$5.75 AND ABOVE.

SHEEP: COMPARED WEEK AGO, LAMBS MOSTLY 50¢-\$1.00 LOWER, YEARLINGS \$1.00-1.50 LOWER. FAT EWES FULLY 25¢ DOWN, BETTER GRADE LAMBS ADVANCED LATE, WHILE OTHERS AND YEARLINGS CONTINUED TO DESCEND, THUS WIDENING THE PRICE SPREAD. TODAY'S BULKS GOOD AND CHOICE NATIVE EWE AND WETHER LAMBS \$8.25-9.00, FEW \$9.25. STRICTLY CHOICE IDAHOES \$9.50, ALSO WEEK'S TOP. NATIVE BUCKS \$7.25-8.00, THROWOUTS \$5.50-6.00, DRY FED YEARLINGS \$5.50-6.75, GRASSY KINDS \$3.50-5.00, FAT EWES \$1.00-2.25.

KANSAS CITY

CATTLE: CURTAILED RECEIPTS OF CATTLE THIS WEEK RESULTED IN ANOTHER PRICE ADVANCE OF 25-50¢ ON LIGHT WEIGHT STEERS AND YEARLINGS, BUT STRONG WEIGHT STEERS LOST PART OF THE EARLY GAIN AND FINISHED STEADY TO 25¢ HIGHER AS COMPARED WITH A WEEK AGO. SOUTH TEXAS GRASS STEERS AND SLAUGHTER COWS WERE STRONG TO MOSTLY 25¢ HIGHER. CHOICE MIXED YEARLINGS TOPPED AT \$8.60, LIGHT WEIGHT STEERS REACHED \$8.50 AND BEST HEAVY STEERS CASHED AT \$7.75. BULK OF NATIVE FED STEERS AND YEARLINGS SOLD FROM \$6.50-8.00. MOST HEAVY STEERS \$7.50 AND DOWN; BULLS WERE 10¢-15¢ HIGHER, WHILE VEALERS RULED STEADY TO 50¢ LOWER WITH A TOP OF \$8.00.

HOGS: REDUCED SUPPLIES OF HOGS STIMULATED DEMAND WITH THE LIGHTER WEIGHTS 25¢ AND DOWN ADVANCING 40-45¢ AND HEAVIER WEIGHTS TAKING AN UPTURN OF 50-55¢. A FEW SMALL LOTS OF 155-200# WEIGHTS SOLD TODAY AT \$6.50, BUT THE PRACTICAL TOP WAS \$6.45. BULK OF 150-350# AVERAGES CASHED FROM WITHIN A NARROW SPREAD OF \$6.20-6.45. PACKING SOWS CLOSED AROUND 45¢ HIGHER WITH BULK GOING AT \$4.65-5.35.

SHEEP: PRICES PAID FOR ALL KILLING CLASSES BROKE SHARPLY; LAMB VALUES DECLINED \$1.00-1.50 WITH COMMON KINDS AT THE MAXIMUM LOSS. YEARLINGS TOOK A 50¢ TO 75¢ PRICE CUT, WHILE MATURE CLASSES REGISTERED 25-50¢ LOSS. ON THE HIGH SPOT CHOICE IDAHO LAMBS MADE \$8.75, BUT THE LATE BULK OF THE BETTER GRADES OF NATIVES RANGED AT \$7.00-7.50. TEXAS WETHERS CASHED AT \$1.75-2.10.

OMAHA

CATTLE: STRENGTH AND ACTIVITY FEATURED THE MARKET ON MOST DAYS THIS WEEK AND PRICES ON PRACTICALLY ALL KILLING CLASSES WORKED HIGHER. FED STEERS AND YEARLINGS MADE UP THE BULK OF THE SUPPLY WITH THE QUALITY IMPROVED. MOST OF THE SUPPLY GOOD AND CHOICE. LIGHT STEERS AND YEARLINGS WERE IN BEST DEMAND, PRICES ADVANCED 25-50¢, YEARLINGS SHOWING THE FULL ADVANCE. WEIGHTY STEERS AND MEDIUM WEIGHTS CLOSED THE WEEK STRONG TO 25¢ HIGHER. HEIFERS ADVANCED 50-75¢, BEEF COWS 25-50¢ AND CUTTER GRADES CLOSED STRONG TO 25¢ HIGHER. BULLS ARE 25-50¢ HIGHER FOR THE WEEK AND VEALERS STEADY. CHOICE YEARLINGS TOPPED AT \$8.75, 1300# STEERS \$8.15, HEIFERS \$8.25.

HOGS: ARRIVAL FOR THE HOGS FOR THE PAST REVIEW WEEK HAVE AGAIN BEEN OF MODERATE PROPORTIONS, BUT IT WAS RATHER EXCELLENT DEMAND FROM ALL BUYING SOURCES THAT INFLUENCED A SHARP ADVANCE IN VALUES. ONE OF THE OUTSTANDING FEATURES OF THE TRADE HAS BEEN THE SERIES OF ACTIVE MARKETS AND COMPLETE CLEARANCES BY MIDSESSION. COMPARISONS THURSDAY WITH THURSDAY UNCOVER A NET UPTURN OF 30-65¢, MOST GRADE FINISHING WITH GAINS OF 40-60¢. THURSDAY'S TOP REACHED \$6.50, WITH THE FOLLOWING BULKS-160-250# SELECTIONS \$6.15-6.40, 250-350# BUTCHERS \$6.00-6.25, PACKING SOWS \$4.75-5.50; STAGS \$4.50-5.25.

SHEEP: UNDER THE INFLUENCES OF A DEPRESSED LAMB TRADE AT EASTERN CONSUMING CENTERS AND THE LOCAL INQUIRY CONFINED TO THE BIG PACKERS, TREND TO LAMBS AND YEARLING VALUES WAS SHARPLY LOWER. LAMB PRICES DROPPED GENERALLY 75¢, YEARLINGS \$1.00-1.25, SLAUGHTER EWES 75¢-\$1.00 ON THURSDAY. GOOD AND CHOICE RANGE SLAUGHTER LAMBS SOLD \$7.50-8.65, TOP \$8.75, CHOICE NATIVES \$8.00-8.25, FED NEW CROP LAMBS WOOLED \$8.25, SHORN \$8.15, FED YEARLINGS \$5.00-6.00, GOOD AND CHOICE EWES \$1.00-1.50.

MOST HOGS INDICATE AN ADVANCE OF 50-70¢ OVER LAST THURSDAY WITH SOWS AND PIGS 25-50¢ UP; FOR THE WEEK- REALIZED IN TODAY'S SESSION WAS \$6.85 PAID FREELY WITH BULK OF DESIRABLE 150-250# CLOSING IN A SPREAD OF \$6.75-6.85; OFFERINGS AROUND 270-280# AT \$6.70. VERY FEW WEIGHTY HOGS AVAILABLE LATE. LIGHT LIGHTS OF 130-150# QUOTABLE AT \$6.40-6.75, 100-130# \$6.25-6.50; SOWS \$5.00-5.50.

SHEEP: LAMBS MOSTLY 50-75¢ LOWER FOR THE WEEK. CULL AND COMMON GRADES \$1.00-1.50 LOWER. SHEEP GENERALLY STEADY.
