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JUNE FARM WORK EXCEEDS 1960 MARK WAGE RATE INCREASE CONTINUES

The number of farm workers during the week of June 18-24 is estimated at 8.3 million, about 1 percent more than a year earlier. Farm family workers totaled 5.6 million, a decrease of 1 percent from late June of last year and a new record low for this date. Hired worker numbers are estimated at 2.7 million, which is 4 percent above the June 1960 level, and the largest force of hired farm workers estimated for the June survey period since 1955.

Moderate decreases under a year ago in the number of family workers were shown in a majority of States. Increases occurred in North Carolina, Kentucky, Tennessee, and Pacific Coast States which offset most of these decreases. Increases over a year ago in the number of hired workers were largest in California, Texas, North Carolina, South Carolina, Missouri, and Illinois. Other States also contributed increases which brought regional totals above June 1960 in the North Central, South Central, South Atlantic and Pacific regions. Regional totals were up 9 percent in the Pacific and East North Central regions, and 4 percent in the South Atlantic, West North Central, and West South Central regions.

Compared with the low levels of worker numbers reported in the May survey week of this year, the June force reflects more than the usual seasonal gain. June hired workers increased about 40 percent in number over May compared with the 5-year average increase of 28 percent and last year's increase of 34 percent. The timing of crop work, the amount of delayed work to be done, and the extent of open weather for good field work are among the factors which caused sharp seasonal changes in employment on many farms. Remarkably few instances of critical worker shortages were reported during June this year. More often, seasonal workers waited for crops to mature or good weather to bring in the expected rush periods for farm work.

July Wage Rates Average 2 Percent Above 1960

Continued moderate increases in farm wage rates as compared with a year earlier were reported quite generally. The U.S. average composite rate per hour about July 1 was \$0.825, which is 2 percent above the July 1, 1960 average. The seasonally adjusted index of U.S. farm wage rates reached 648 percent of the 1910-14 average. This compared with the index of 631 a year

earlier but shows little change from the seasonally adjusted index of 647 for April 1, 1961.

Increases in wage rates were most general for regular workers at monthly rates and for hourly workers in areas other than the South. They occurred less frequently where day by day hand work such as chopping cotton predominated. New methods of fighting weeds in cotton fields reportedly are making significant further reductions this year in needs for hand labor. The drought in the Northern Plains reduced employment and cut some wage rates.

June Farm Work Theme-- "Make Hay While the Sun Shines"

Putting up hay and forage for livestock is big work in most States, and June on most farms means making hay. Well over half of all farms that harvest any cropland grow and harvest hay. The huge tonnage that must be cut, moved, and stored made so much hard work that engineers and farmers have continually developed and changed machines and methods for handling the forage crops. The result has undoubtedly been fewer farm backaches and less outpouring of sweat in hot and humid hayfields in many a race to get hay under cover before the next downpour. However, handling the U.S. hay crop of over 100 million tons and uncounted millions of tons of other forage still takes a lot of doing for men as well as machines.

During June much of the clover and clover-grass-mixed-hay in heavy hay producing North-Central and North-Eastern States comes to cutting stage. Weather the past month was none too favorable for curing in many sections in this area, and where rain interfered too much with haying, farmers with equipment available chopped the grass into silage. Because of cool weather this year New York, largest clover-grass hay State, had harvested only about a tenth of the hay crop, but several counties had reported at least 60 percent of grass silage cut by the end of June. About half of Illinois and Iowa clover hay had been cut. Drought in North Dakota and parts of South Dakota, Montana, and Minnesota reduced both hay tonnage and haying jobs for hired workers. The first cutting of alfalfa was practically completed through Nebraska and Kansas while in Oklahoma and southern Kansas, second cuttings were in progress. In California, third and fourth cuttings of alfalfa were active in main areas.

Despite the continuing slowness of the crop season, harvest of a number of crops moved into greater activity by the end of June. The wheat harvest was nearing clean-up stage in Oklahoma and was about one-fourth done in Kansas. Harvest of green peas was starting in several parts of the country. Harvest of peaches proceeded in southeastern areas. Tobacco harvest increased in Georgia and certain areas in the Carolinas. Strawberry harvest reached New England after wide activity in most sections. Blueberry harvest started in New Jersey. The varied fruit and vegetable activities in Pacific Coast States included raspberries in Washington, berries and cherries in Oregon, and many varieties of specialty crops in California.
