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July Wage Rates Show Sharper Increase Farm Work Force Increases Seasonally

During the survey week of June 20-26, weather across the country was generally favorable for field work. The farm work force totaled 6,840,000 workers, continuing the usual seasonal increase. This was 12 percent above May but 8 percent below June 1964. Of the total work force, 4,587,000 were farm family workers, 3 percent above May but 9 percent below June of last year. An estimated 2,253,000 hired workers were employed on farms during the June survey week, about one-third more than May but 7 percent below the same month a year ago. The January-June averages for 48 States as shown on page 5 are lower than for 1964 by the following percentages: All workers, 9 percent; family workers, 10 percent; and hired workers, 8 percent.

Length of Work Week Unchanged

The length of the farm work week for all farm workers, as indicated by reporting farmers, was 41.3 hours, the same as last month. Family workers averaged 46.5 hours, up 2 percent from the previous month. Hired farm workers averaged 33.4 hours, 3 percent less than in May.

In the West South Central States where the weather was favorable and field work active, the average hours worked during the survey week were as follows: All farm workers, 36.9 hours, up 6 percent from May; family workers, 48.1 hours, up 13 percent; and hired workers, 32.7 hours, up 6 percent.

July Farm Wage Rates Up 4 Percent, Largest Increase Over Previous Year Since 1959

The level of farm wage rates reported by farm operators on July 1, 1965, was 25 percent above the 1957-59 average, and 4 percent over a year earlier. The average cash rate per hour, without board or room, increased 4 percent over July 1, 1964, to \$1.17 per hour. Monthly and daily rates also showed gains of 4 to 5 percent. Comparisons of July 1 State averages for 1964 and 1965 on pages 7 and 8 show the generally consistent trend in States and regions of wage increases for different hiring arrangements. In Index terms, the National average reached 726 percent of the historic base period 1910-14, up from the 1964 average of 701 percent. As usual the highest wage rates were reported for farm workers in Alaska, and were as follows: Per month with house, \$400; per month with board and room, \$295; per day with board and room, \$16.50; and per hour without board or room, \$2.10. Alaska farm workers during the survey week June 20-26 totaled 1,000 persons -- 700 family workers and 300 hired workers.

Row Crop Cultivation and Small Grain Harvest Progressed Rapidly

In the Northeast and Middle Atlantic States, scattered showers during the survey week brought temporary relief in some areas, but dry soils were still a problem, especially in New Jersey and Pennsylvania where pastures were in poor condition and crop growth was very slow. Supplemental feeding of livestock from this year's hay crop was common. Maine potatoes made an excellent start in Aroostook County and growth was satisfactory in other areas. Hay harvest made good progress during June but short soil moisture resulted in below normal yields in many cases. Blueberry harvest was active in New Jersey with plentiful supplies on the market.

In the North Central States, farm work consisted mostly of cutting hay, planting, and cultivating row crops. Corn and soybeans were generally in good condition; however, wet weather delayed plantings in many areas. Wheat and other small grain harvest was beginning or underway in many areas but was behind the usual schedule. The first cutting of alfalfa was underway or near completion. However, wet weather was a problem during part of the period, although it caused little damage.

The South Atlantic States enjoyed mostly favorable weather for farm work. Corn and soybean prospects were good. Cotton was in good condition but cool night temperatures the last half of the month slowed growth in some areas. Peach harvest was well underway in the commercial producing areas. Mid-June rains caused some damage to mature peaches in Georgia. Cropping of tobacco was general over most of the Georgia Belt and beginning in other areas. Shade tobacco harvest passed the mid-point in Florida. Citrus harvest in Florida was practically complete. Apple prospects were good in commercial areas.

The South Central States experienced generally good weather with showers relieving dry soil conditions in many areas. About half the cotton crop was putting on squares with some of the acreage setting bolls. By the time the last cotton acreage was planted in Texas, harvest of the 1965 crop had started in the lower Rio Grande Valley. Harvest of wheat and other small grains was near completion by July 1. Broomcorn harvest was underway in South Texas and beginning in Oklahoma. Rice prospects were mostly good. Haying was active.

The Mountain States had favorable weather for farm work during June. Rains brought welcomed relief from drought conditions in some areas. Heavy rains in the eastern plains of Colorado changed the agricultural picture almost overnight. The first cutting of alfalfa had been harvested in most areas. Alfalfa weevils and grasshoppers were causing some damage. Row crops were generally in good condition and cultivation was active. Cool weather delayed cotton growth in areas of Arizona but the plants continued setting squares and blooming.

The Pacific Coast States received light showers which were beneficial to crops. Strawberry harvest was progressing rapidly in Washington and Oregon. Haying progressed as good weather prevailed during most of June. Sugar beet harvest was well underway in the Imperial Valley with reports of excellent yields and quality. Cotton growth was slowed considerably by cool weather in California and very few fields showed signs of blooming.
