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September Work Progress Slow Fewer Farm Workers - Wage Rates Up Sharply

Harvesting field crops was slowed or nearly stopped by rains and cold weather in late September over much of the Nation. During the survey week of September 19-25 the number of persons doing farm work was 6,660,000 - 8 percent below a year earlier and a record low for the date. Weather hindrances to harvesting of cotton, small grains, silage crops, soybeans, and many other crops gave a further downward push to the continuing downtrend in farm employment that has resulted from labor-saving methods.

Considerably fewer hired farm workers were employed in some leading seasonal activities. The total of 1,982,000 persons was 7 percent under the 1964 total for the date and a record low for this normally busy season.

Farm family worker numbers also reached a new September low of 4,678,000 persons 8 percent under 1964. Despite the recurring chores of tending milk cows, other livestock, and poultry on many farms, fewer family workers were needed because of the bad conditions for field work.

September's weather this year averaged cooler and wetter than usual over large areas and slowed maturity of cotton, corn, and other crops. Consequently, harvest progress on late-maturing crops lags behind last year in many sections. The harvest situation has been extremely unfavorable in the Red River Valley of Minnesota and North Dakota where small grain crops in some fields have been lying in the windrow or swath since Labor Day. In North Dakota only about 10 percent of small grain combining could be done during the entire month.

Farm Wage Rates up Sharply from a Year Ago

The level of farm wage rates reported by farm operators on October 1, 1965, reached a new high for the month, 28 percent above the 1957-59 average. The average cash rate per hour, without board or room, at \$1.09 per hour was 8 percent higher than October 1964. Monthly, weekly, and daily rates also showed gains up to 7 percent. October 1 State averages for 1965 on page 7 show the generally consistent trend in wage rates by States and regions for the different hiring arrangements. In index terms, the national average reached 746 percent of the historic base period 1910-14, up from the 1964 average of 694 percent.

Farm wage rates have been rising gradually since 1950, but this is the sharpest October-to-October rise since 1951 when the pressures of the Korean War pushed the hourly cash rate up 11 percent.

Farm Workers Work Fewer Hours Than a Month Earlier

As generally unfavorable weather prevailed in many areas during the week, workers on reporting farms averaged 37.9 hours of farm work, 1.4 hours less than in the comparable week a month earlier. Farm operators averaged 44.6 hours, and other family members averaged 32.1 hours - down 1.8 and 1.9 hours respectively. Hired farm workers averaged 33.3 hours, down 0.8 hours from the survey week in August.

Hired farm workers averaged fewer hours during the survey week than a month earlier in all regions except the Middle Atlantic and South Atlantic, where rainfall was light and harvesting of potatoes, apples, cotton, and tobacco made good progress. In the Middle Atlantic States hired workers averaged 41.1 hours, up 3.9 hours. Hired workers in the South Atlantic States averaged 28.8 hours, an increase of 4.6 hours over the comparable week a month earlier.

Favorable Work Progress in Some Areas

The western and eastern extremes of the Nation had generally favorable weather in late September, and harvests of late crops made good progress. Maine potatoes were nearly two-thirds harvested. In New York the McIntosh apple crop was being picked at a rapid rate, and harvest was starting on early grape varieties in the Finger Lakes, Chautauqua, and Erie growing sections. Pennsylvania tobacco cutting neared completion, and apple and potato harvests increased. In Virginia, 85 percent or more of the tobacco crop was harvested. In North Carolina only scattered fields of tobacco remained uncut, and harvests of corn, peanuts, and cotton were active. Peanut digging and threshing neared completion in Georgia, Alabama, and South Carolina. In Alabama about 38 percent of the cotton was harvested by October 1.

Harvests of vegetable and fruit crops in California this year have presented problems of obtaining adequate labor for the fast shifting demands. To meet the peak needs of harvesting tomatoes for processing, about 17,000 Mexican Nationals were being employed under special arrangement. Harvest of grapes for raisins was completed, and table and wine grape harvests continued. Apple harvest was very active in Washington. In Oregon, apple picking had started in the Hood River and Rogue River districts. The potato harvest was starting in both central Oregon and Klamath River areas.
