September Labor Force 7 Percent Below Last Year

The Nation's farm labor force totaled 5,799,000 workers for the week of September 17-23. This represented a decline of 7 percent from the corresponding period in September 1966 and a drop of 1 percent from the August 1967 survey week. The sharpest decline occurred in Texas, as Hurricane Beulah dumped heavy rains on the southern part of the State.

Farm operators and other unpaid family members totaled 4,184,000 -- 4 percent less than last year's total for the same period. The number of family workers was 3 percent above the August 1967 survey week.

The number of hired workers totaled 1,615,000. This was 12 and 13 percent below August 1967 and September 1966 survey weeks, respectively.

Farm workers averaged 38.9 hours of farm work during the September survey week. This was unchanged from the August survey week. Farm operators averaged 45.2 hours, slightly below a month ago. Other family members worked an average of 31.9 hours, 7 percent below the August survey period. This decline was offset by the hours worked by hired workers. Hired workers averaged 35.0 hours, up 3 percent from August.

Beulah's Tongue Lashes Out Across Texas

Hurricane Beulah caused widespread flooding in South Texas. Generous showers fell from the Texas Panhandle to New England. Warm dry weather returned to the West while the East continued cool.

The corn crop developed rapidly in the absence of a widespread freeze in the Corn Belt. Scattered frosts were noted. Crop maturity is behind normal. Harvest is underway from Kansas to Maryland and Delaware. Harvest continued active in Southern and South Atlantic States.

Cotton harvest in the southern part of Texas was brought to a complete standstill as Hurricane Beulah moved inland. Harvest was slowed in north Texas by rainy weather. Picking of cotton made good progress in

Georgia, Alabama, and Louisiana. Cotton maturity and harvest continued slow in the Carolinas, Mississippi, Tennessee, and Arkansas. The crop is making good progress in the Western States with harvest well underway in New Mexico and Arizona.

Harvest of most types of tobacco neared completion. Flue-cured harvest is complete in North Carolina; about 85 percent of the Virginia crop had been harvested. Kentucky's burley harvest was 90 percent complete with about three-fourths of the North Carolina and Virginia crops harvested.

Peanut prospects continued good. Harvest progressed rapidly in most areas. Rainy weather caused some delay in digging of the Texas and Oklahoma crops.

Weather conditions were generally favorable for development of soybeans. The crop is later than usual. Harvest in Illinois is about 10-15 percent complete. Harvest is just getting started in Arkansas and other States to the north. Harvest is active in the Delta States.

Small grain harvest continued on late maturing acreages in the Northwest. Harvest is virtually complete in all other areas of the country. Sorghum developed rapidly throughout the Central Plains. Harvest operations were slowed by rainy weather in Texas and Oklahoma. Harvest was active in other early areas. Harvest was just getting started in Kansas.

Rice harvest was underway in Arkansas, Mississippi, and California. Harvest neared completion in Texas and Louisiana. Dry bean harvest was about half over in Michigan and Colorado. Cutting and windrowing of beans neared completion in Idaho. Harvest of silage corn was nearly over in some Southern States and was active over the rest of the country. Mint harvest continued in Washington.

Harvest of the apple crop was active in most major producing areas. Hurricane Beulah inflicted heavy damage to the Texas citrus crop. There was limited citrus harvest in California and Florida. Harvest of other seasonal fruit crops progressed throughout the country. Almond harvest was active in California. Walnut orchards in California were prepared for harvest. Walnut and filbert harvest is later than normal in Oregon.

Late summer and fall potato digging was active throughout the country. Heavy rains, beginning on September 22, interrupted harvest in Aroostook County, Maine. Harvest of sweetpotatoes and seasonal vegetables continued in most producing areas. Planting of winter vegetables increased in major producing areas except Texas. Hurricane Beulah severely damaged late summer and fall vegetable crops in southeast Texas. Planting of the winter crop is not expected to resume until mid-October.

Farm Wage Rates Continue Upward Trend

The level of farm wage rates reported by farm operators on October 1, 1967, was 8 percent higher than a year earlier. This is a new high for the month and is 52 percent above the 1957-59 average. The average cash rate per hour, without board or room, increased 9 percent over October 1, 1966, to \$1.29 per hour. Monthly, weekly, and daily rates showed similar gains. In index terms, the national average reached 883 (1910-14=100), up from the 1966 average of 812.

Wage rates reported for farm workers in Alaska were as follows: per month with house, \$400; per month with board and room, \$310; per day without board or room, \$18.00; and per hour without board or room, \$2.20.
