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SPRING WORK UNDERWAY AS WEATHER PERMITS

The Nation's farm labor force for the survey week of March 21-27 is estimated at 3,904,000 workers or about 5,000 fewer than a year earlier. The work force consisted of 3,073,000 farm operators and unpaid family members and 831,000 hired workers.

Farm workers averaged 35.1 hours during the March survey week compared with 34.3 a month earlier. Farm operators worked an average of 37.9 hours, other unpaid family members 29.8, and hired hands, 33.1 hours during the week.

Light precipitation in the form of snow provided limited moisture to the winter wheat crop in the Great Plains. However, drying winds depleted top soil moisture in western parts of Kansas and Oklahoma. Grain crops in western Oklahoma and Texas badly need rain. In the Northern Plains, winter wheat and rye are greening, but cold weather and snow have halted development. Fall seedings in the Northwest are growing slowly, but fields in Southern California and Arizona are starting to head.

Seeding of spring grains is underway as far north as Pennsylvania and Illinois. Wet conditions in the South have restricted land preparation. Cold and snow have limited tillage activity and damaged some tobacco plants in the Middle Atlantic States. Field work is increasing in the Southern Corn Belt and in the West where conditions are dryer. However, in the extremely dry South Texas area planting is behind a year ago.

Corn planting was underway in the Deep South and cotton planting activity was in full swing in Texas, California, and Arizona. Texas and Louisiana's rice seedings are ahead of last year. Potatoes were being seeded in the Middle Atlantic States and in Washington State.

Cold dry weather is causing erratic blooming of Florida citrus. Citrus picking is active in Texas and Arizona but rains have curtailed activities in California's orchards and vineyards. Frost nipped some peach orchards in the South. Peach buds were swelling as far north as Maryland.

Florida vegetable shipments remain steady, with most commodities except melons available. The March 21st frost damaged some corn and beans in northern areas. Irrigated spring vegetables are growing well in South Texas, but dry-land crops are suffering from drought. Onion pulling increased in the Lower Valley. Arizona cantaloupes made good growth in the Yuma area; with lettuce harvest active in the Salt River Valley. California growers were busy planting sweet corn and tomatoes. Wet fields slowed vegetable seeding in the South and Pacific Northwest. Some spinach was cut in west Arkansas, and some strawberries picked in Louisiana.

Farm Wage Rates

Farm operators reported that wage rates on April 1, 1971 were up 5 percent from a year earlier. The average cash rate per hour without board and room rose to \$1.76 from \$1.66 on April 1, 1970. Monthly, weekly, and daily rates were up similarly. The seasonally adjusted national average index reached 1,157 on the 1910-14=100 base and 137 on the 1967 base. This is an increase of 6 percent.

Alaska Farm Wage Rates

Wage rates reported for farm workers in Alaska were: per month with house \$430; per month with board and room \$330; per day without board and room \$20; and per hour with board and room \$2.30. Alaska has about 200 hired farm workers.

Farm employment represents number of family and hired labor working during the survey week. Family labor includes farm operators working on farms one hour or more plus other family members working 15 hours or more without receiving cash wages during survey week. Hired workers include all persons working one hour or more for cash wages during the survey week. These data should not be confused with the data published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) derived from the Current Population Survey (CPS). The BLS data are derived from a household survey where each member 16 years of age and older is classified as performing farm or nonfarm work on the basis of major activity during the survey week.
