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Harvest Slowed by Wet Conditions

The Nation's farm labor force for the survey week of September 19-25 is estimated at 5,120,000 workers, down 4 percent from a year ago. The farm work force consisted of 3,675,500 farm operators and unpaid family members and 1,444,500 hired workers.

Farmworkers averaged 37.6 hours during the September survey week compared with 37.9 hours in August. Farm operators worked an average of 43.1 hours; other unpaid family members, 31.5; and hired hands worked 33.4 hours during the September week.

Farm operators reported wage rates on October 1, 1971, were up about 5 1/2 percent from a year earlier. The average cash rate without board and room rose to \$1.70 per hour from \$1.61 on October 1, 1970. Monthly, weekly, and daily rates were up similarly. The seasonally adjusted national index reached 133 on the 1967 base, an increase of 5 percent from a year earlier.

Rains in late September curbed field activity on farms over much of the Nation. The cotton harvest was slowed in Texas and throughout all of the South except Georgia and South Carolina where picking gained momentum. Picking was active in the California desert area and defoliation started in the San Joaquin Valley. Wet weather and high moisture also tied up the grain corn harvest. Activity will increase with dryer weather because most of the corn is ready for the crib. Soybean harvest was underway. Wet weather and weeds were causing a delay in the South. In much of the Corn Belt rain kept the combines out of the fields although harvest is ahead of a year ago in Illinois.

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Farm employment represents number of family and hired labor working during the survey week. Family labor includes farm operators working on farms one hour or more plus other family members working 15 hours or more without receiving cash wages during survey week. Hired workers include all persons working one hour or more for cash wages during the survey week. These data should not be confused with the data published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) derived from the Current Population Survey (CPS). The BLS data are derived from a household survey where each member 16 years of age and older is classified as performing farm or nonfarm work on the basis of major activity during the survey week.

QUARTERLY PROBABILITY FARM LABOR SURVEY

The selected wage rate items presented below were derived from a probability farm labor survey conducted in July 1971 by the Statistical Reporting Service. This continues the series of published farm wage rates from Quarterly probability surveys started in April 1970. These data do not replace the farm wage rate series regularly published in Farm Labor, but supplement them.

The inputs for making the following wage rate computations were supplied by employers of farm labor in the mainland 48 States. The sample was not large enough to provide wage rates for all States, but was of sufficient size to provide indicators for California and the United States.

Apple harvest was widespread on northern fruit farms and cranberries were being harvested in New Jersey, Massachusetts, and Wisconsin. The Thompson seedless grape harvest for raisins was nearing completion. Fall shipments of vegetables were increasing from the Northeast where rain has slowed harvest. Harvest of the fall potato crop made good progress as favorable conditions existed in most of the major producing areas.

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
