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## SPRING WORK GAINS MOMENTUM

The Nation's farm labor force for the survey week of March 19-25, 1972 was estimated at 3,912,000 workers or about 18,000 more than a year ago. The work force consisted of 3,033,000 farm operators and unpaid family members and 879,000 hired workers.

Farmworkers averaged 36.4 hours during the March survey week compared with 34.5 a month earlier. Farm operators worked an average of 38.8 hours, other unpaid family members 30.4, and hired workers 36.0 hours during the week.

Farm wages were generally higher on April 1, 1972 and the average cash rate per hour without board and room rose to \$1.84 per hour from \$1.76 a year earlier. Monthly, weekly, and daily rates increased similarly. The seasonally adjusted national index of Farm Wage Rates reached 144 on the 1967 base for an increase of 6 percent over a year ago.

Light rain showers did little to improve the topsoil moisture situation in the Great Plains. Grain growers from Texas to Nebraska would appreciate a slow soaking rain. More moisture is needed for a fast spring start. In the Northern Plains fall-planted grains are in good shape. Recent rains and snow have built up moisture reserves. Wheat and barley are headed in the Yuma, Arizona area. In New Mexico nonirrigated grains need rain badly. In the Southeastern States fall-sown grains are in good condition. Some grains in local areas of southern Alabama and Georgia are infected with rust.

Southern farmers took advantage of the favorable weather to work in the fields. Plowing, disking, fertilizing and applying chemicals, were the main activities. Further north, the fieldwork tapers off. In the northern Corn Belt farmers are anxious to put their tractors to work but snow, frozen soil, or mud dictate that they wait.

Corn planting was underway in the Deep South and a few fields were in as far north as Oklahoma and Kansas. Warm dry weather permitted cotton planting from California to Texas. Sorghum planting was in full swing in Texas.

Tobacco growers were busy seeding plant beds in Kentucky and Tennessee.

Potato planting got underway in the Arkansas Valley of Colorado. Vegetables were seeded as far north as Maryland. Tomato transplanting was active in Alabama, South Carolina, and Louisiana.

Florida cabbage, celery, sweet corn, and tomato supplies were moving to market. Onions were being harvested in Texas. Lettuce cutting was active in Arizona and California. There was increasing activity in the strawberry harvest in Louisiana and California.

Frosts and cold temperatures nipped peach orchards in the Carolinas but damage is expected to be minor. Idaho fruit growers are concerned that cold temperatures may have caused bud and bloom damage. Colorado's peaches were in bloom, the earliest bloom of record, but were severely damaged by a cold wave late in the month. Utah's fruit was also hurt by the cold weather, as were pears in the Medford area of Oregon.

Snows from Montana to Minnesota created additional work in caring for animals. Regular winter rations are still being fed to herds in the north. Feed supplies should be adequate until pastures are ready for grazing. Supplemental feeding declined in the South where the stock are moving into pastures.

Farm employment represents number of family and hired labor working during the survey week. Family labor includes farm operators working on farms one hour or more plus other family members working 15 hours or more without receiving cash wages during survey week. Hired workers include all persons working one hour or more for cash wages during the survey week. These data should not be confused with the data published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) derived from the Current Population Survey (CPS). The BLS data are derived from a household survey where each member 16 years of age and older is classified as performing farm or nonfarm work on the basis of major activity during the survey week.
