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FARM LABOR FORCE DOWN SLIGHTLY

The farm labor force in the United States numbered 3,852,400 workers during the survey week of March 18-24, 1973. This was 48,000 less than a year earlier as wet fields continued to limit work in many areas. Farm operators and unpaid family workers totaled 2,983,100 and hired workers accounted for 869,300, both slightly less than March 1972.

Farm workers averaged 35.9 hours during the March survey week compared with 36.4 hours in March a year ago. Farm operators worked an average of 38.5 hours, other unpaid family workers 30.8, and hired workers 33.6 hours during the week.

WAGES CONTINUE UP

Farm wage rates rose to \$1.97 per hour (without board and room), up 13 cents from the rate paid a year ago. Wages paid per month, per week, and per day were also higher. The seasonally adjusted index of Farm Wage rates came in at 157 (1967 base), an increase of 8 percent from a year ago.

WET SOILS MINIMIZE FIELD WORK

Spring planting was underway in the South Atlantic States and south Texas during the week of March 18-24. Farmers in Texas were busy planting corn, sorghum, and rice during the week but progress was far behind normal. Tobacco growers in North Carolina, Kentucky, and Tennessee were busy seeding plantbeds. Water damaged some tobacco beds in flue-cured areas of North Carolina. Potato planting was active on the Eastern Shore of Virginia with some sweetpotato beds started. Farmers as far north as Maryland made good progress planting the early vegetable crop. Tomato transplanting was active in South Carolina.

Wet soils further delayed field work and spring land preparation throughout the South Central Region and into the southern Corn Belt. Soils in Indiana and Ohio became progressively drier during the survey week with plowing and fertilizing taking place. However, farmers in the other Corn Belt States continue to wait for fields to dry so they can catch up on fall and spring plowing.

The Navel orange harvest in California continued at a moderate pace while lemon harvesting was active. Citrus picking remained active in Texas with trees reaching the full bloom stage. Citrus trees in Florida continued in excellent condition and were near the peak of blooming for oranges. Fruit growers in Oregon and California had to fire orchard heaters during the survey week to avoid frost damage to fruit trees. Tree spraying was active in California. Early varieties of apples, walnuts, cherries, and pears are beginning to bloom. Strawberry picking increased but rain caused some damage to southern California's crop. Strawberry harvest got a limited start in Louisiana.

Wet fields in Arizona delayed the lettuce and mixed vegetable harvest. In California, spring lettuce harvesting was in full swing at Riverside, while asparagus cutting was slowed by wet fields in the San Joaquin-Delta areas. Most Florida vegetables are in seasonal supply with volume increasing. Onion supplies in the Texas Lower Rio Grande Valley remain light and carrot digging in south Texas continued.

A few remaining fields of 1972 crop cotton, corn, and soybeans were harvested during the survey week, although wet fields continued to limit work in most areas. Nebraska farmers still waited to harvest the last of the corn and sorghum grain. Mississippi faced the same problem with cotton and soybeans.

Flooding during the survey week damaged some unharvested acreage in the southern Mississippi River Delta and caused losses to fences, crops and livestock in northern Mississippi, Alabama, and Tennessee. Farmers in these States spent most of the survey week repairing fences and clearing debris left from the flood waters.

Farm employment represents number of family and hired labor working during the survey week. Family labor includes farm operators working on farms one hour or more plus other family members working 15 hours or more without receiving cash wages during survey week. Hired workers include all persons working one hour or more for cash wages during the survey week. These data should not be confused with the data published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) derived from the Current Population Survey (CPS). The BLS data are derived from a household survey where each member 16 years of age and older is classified as performing farm or nonfarm work on the basis of major activity during the survey week.
