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WORK FORCE LARGER THAN YEAR AGO

The Nation's farm labor force for the survey week of June 17-23, 1973 totaled 5,177,400 workers, 78,000 more than a year ago. The work force was made up of 3,545,100 operators and unpaid family members and 1,632,300 hired workers.

Farm workers averaged 41.5 hours during the survey week compared with 40.0 hours last year and 41.9 hours during the May survey week. Farm operators worked 49.6 hours, other unpaid family members 36.3, and hired workers 35.0 hours.

Wages Continue To Climb

Farm wage rates rose to \$2.02 per hour (without board or room) on July 1, 1973, an increase of 17 cents from last year. Wages paid by the month, week and day were also higher. The seasonally adjusted index of Farm Wage Rates was 156 on July 1, 1973, about 10 percent higher than a year ago.

Harvest Gains Momentum

Winter wheat harvest on the southern Great Plains gained momentum during the week of June 17-23. Good progress was made in Texas on the High and Low Plains but rains stopped combining elsewhere in the State. In Oklahoma, the wheat harvest moved briskly but combine shortages were developing. In Kansas, wheat harvest was active but progress was behind normal. Combining of small grains was active in the South when weather permitted and was in full swing in the Southwest.

Planting of corn was virtually complete in the Corn Belt although it had continued about 2 weeks later than usual in most States. Cultivation for weed control was active.

Soybean planting advanced in the Corn Belt. It was a good week with much planting accomplished in most areas. In the South, soybeans were 80 percent planted, somewhat behind last year's progress in most States.

Planting of cotton was completed in most areas. The crop was generally in fair to good condition in the South with development ranging from fruiting on schedule in south Texas to early stages of squaring in Mississippi, Arkansas, and Georgia. In California, cotton is blooming with some bolls showing.

Cherry harvesting was active in Oregon despite a shortage of cherry pickers. Sweet cherry harvest was underway in Pennsylvania and New York. Tart cherries are turning color in southwest Michigan. Harvest of early type stone fruits continued active in California. Peach harvest became more active in the South. Valencia harvest in Florida remained active, but grapefruit harvest was near completion. In California, picking of valencia oranges, lemons, grapefruit, and avocados, continued. Harvest of strawberries and bush fruits was active in Northern areas of the United States.

Excessive rainfall damaged vegetable crops in South Carolina and lowered conditions in Georgia. Rain delayed harvest in extreme south Texas. Vegetable harvesting progressed normally in California and Arizona. Light harvest of some vegetables was getting underway in New York, Michigan and other northern vegetable producing States.

Cutting and baling hay was active in areas where weather permitted. Sorghum planting continued in Texas, Kansas, and Missouri. Planting of peanuts in Texas was ahead of last year. Rains delayed normal cultivation for Georgia peanuts.
