COMMERCIAL RED MEAT PRODUCTION for the United States in February 1989 totaled 3.00 billion pounds, down 2 percent from February 1988, according to the Agricultural Statistics Board. January-February red meat production, at 6.27 billion pounds was down 1 percent from last year. The percentage changes from 1988 accumulated production by individual components were: beef, down 4; veal, down 6; pork up 3; lamb and mutton, up 8. Commercial red meat production includes slaughter in Federally inspected and other plants, but excludes animals slaughtered on farms.

Kill days for February 1989 included 20 weekdays (one holiday) and four Saturdays. Kill days for February 1988 consisted of 21 weekdays (one holiday) and four Saturdays.

COMPARING FEBRUARY 1989 WITH FEBRUARY 1988

BEEF PRODUCTION, at 1.74 billion pounds was down 5 percent. Head kill totaled 2.57 million, down 7 from last year. The average live weight increased 14 pounds to 1132.

VEAL PRODUCTION, at 28 million pounds was down 12 percent. Calf slaughter totaled 181 thousand head, down 14 percent, and the average live weight increased 6 pounds to 263.

PORK PRODUCTION, at 1.20 billion pounds was up 2 percent. Hog kill totaled 6.79 million head, up 2 percent. The average live weight at 247 pounds was the same as last year.

LAMB AND MUTTON PRODUCTION, at 27 million pounds was up 4 percent from last year. Slaughter totaled 425 thousand head, up 2 percent. The average live weight increased 2 pounds to 126.
