FEBRUARY 1990 LIVE WEIGHT 12 PERCENT ABOVE LAST YEAR

Kill days for February 1990 include 20 weekdays (including 1 holiday) and four Saturdays, the same as for February 1989.

The preliminary total of **LIVE WEIGHT POULTRY INSPECTED** during February 1990 was 2.41 billion pounds, 12 percent above the 2.15 billion pounds inspected a year ago. Inspections included 1.94 billion pounds of young chickens, 75.4 million pounds of mature chickens, 388 million pounds of turkeys and 11.3 million pounds of ducks.

POULTRY CERTIFIED WHOLESOME during February (ready-to-cook weight), totaled 1.76 billion pounds, up 12 percent from the 1.57 billion pounds certified a year ago. Updated totals for January 1990 show that 1.89 billion pounds were certified.

ANTE-MORTEM CONDEMNATIONS during February 1990 totaled 8.14 million pounds. Condemnations were 0.33 percent of the live weight inspected, compared to 0.45 percent a year ago. **POST-MORTEM CONDEMNATIONS**, at 43.6 million pounds (N.Y. Dressed Weight), were 2.01 percent of quantities inspected compared with 2.19 percent a year earlier.

YOUNG CHICKENS - Commercially grown broilers-fryers and other young immature birds such as roasters and capons.

MATURE CHICKENS - Fowl from breeder and market egg flocks and stags and cocks.

FRYER-ROASTER TURKEYS - Young immature birds, usually under 16 weeks of age.

YOUNG TURKEYS (MATURE) - Young birds grown to a matured market age, about 5 months.

OLD TURKEYS (BREEDERS) - Fully matured birds held for egg production, usually over 15 months of age.

DUCKS - Includes all ducks regardless of age and weight.

OTHER POULTRY - Includes all other ready-to-cook products which bear the U.S.D.A. Inspected for Wholesomeness legend.
